Description of the MSc. program

The MSc. in European Economic Relations organized by the School of Economic Studies is a Master's program which relies on the system of values and specific knowledge for the member states of the European Union.

With this program Bachelor's graduate students will be able to diversify and complete their professional training in the economic field so that they meet the requirements of Romanian and European business environment and the requirements of the central, regional, local or community-based authorities and institutions, under the context of employers' demanding standards.

MSc. students will be prepared for a future profession in European Economic Relations starting from the reality that, given the status of Romania as a member state of E.U. and highly developed globalization, European economic relations will gain greater importance, while our national features will have weaker significance.

Who may apply for this MSc. program?

Bachelor's graduate students who have studied, according to the Curriculum, subjects such as: World Economy, The Economics of the European Union, Micro- and Macroeconomics, Processes and Implications of Globalization or other similar subjects.

How do I take the admission examination?

The admission relies on a contest, namely an essay, considering the grade awarded by the evaluation committee (50%) and the average of Bachelor's examination grade (50%).

Why should I apply for this MSc.?

The graduate students of the MSc. on European Economic Relations will become highly trained specialists in the field and will be able to develop activities in institutions of national central, regional or local administration, in community institutions or in the field of Business, in national or multinational companies that are active globally or in the European economic area.
